The U.S. Geological Survey of the Department of the Interior is presenting a series of topical workshops pertaining to mapping, vegetation, photo-interpretation, remote sensing and Geographical Information Systems. The workshops are part of an effort to exchange information and provide access to spatial technologies developed at the center for natural resource survey. The workshops are available to the general public educators, state and federal agencies. Workshop participation by the international community is also greatly encouraged.

Most of the workshops are 3 days long, creating compact presentation of materials. No previous experience in any of the topical workshop is assumed, except for advanced workshops. USGS's Most Popular Maps Available Online

Hikers, campers, engineers and other users of USGS geographic data can now access digital versions of USGS topographic maps that are available on the Microsoft TerraServer at:

http://www.terraserver.microsoft.com

USGS Digital Raster Graphics (DRG's) are colored topographic maps that have been scanned into the computer. Like the USGS Digital Orthophoto Quadrangles, which are already available on TerraServer, DRG's are seamlessly displayed to the user. The USGS currently has more than 57,000 topographic maps of the U.S. in scales (1:24,000, 1:100,000 and 1:250,000). For some areas, the user can switch between the topo map and the 1-meter res. image of the same locale.

Users are also able to link place names from the USGS Geographic Names Information System (GNIS) to an image. URL:

Nebenzahl Prize for Dissertations in the History of Cartography (Newberry Library)

The Smith Center invites submissions to the *Nebenzahl Prize* for Dissertations in the History of Cartography, which is awarded every two years to an author of a recently completed dissertation, in any field, judged by the prize committee to have made the most significant contribution to the study of the history of cartography. The prize will be awarded on the basis of the dissertation's originality, scholarship, and writing quality.

An outright prize of \$1,500 will be presented to the author at the time of the award. The winner also receives a fellowship to support research related to revision or expansion of the dissertation to be done in residence at the Newberry Library. The fellowship carries a stipend of \$800 per month and will be prorated for periods of two weeks to two months. Prize winners will be offered a review of their dissertations by the University of Chicago Press.

Doctoral dissertations in any field must be submitted no later than November 1, 2000; a significant portion of their content must be concerned with history of cartography. The dissertation must have been approved by an accredited Ph.D. granting institution during the 24-month period prior to the competition deadline (November 1, 1998-October 31, 2000). Submissions from outside the United States are welcome; the copy submitted must be in English. Two paper copies of the dissertation, one bound and one unbound, inclusive of all illustrations, must be submitted along with three letters of recommendation and appropriate documentation from the institution. Authors will be notified of the results of the competition after January 1, 2001.
