Check out the Map Division's digital collection of **Middle Atlantic** maps, and maps of North America, USA and the World, also Western Hemisphere, that show the Middle Atlantic region in NYPL's Digital Collections.

The "**American Shores: Maps of the Middle Atlantic Region to 1850**" site was funded by NEH. Once on the site, you will see highlighted a sampling of maps from the 1000+ which were conserved, cataloged and scanned during 2000-2002. The entire collection you can get to by clicking on the "Browse this collection" button at upper right. On the American Shores site, among the sampling of maps there, you can pan and zoom for greater detail. So far this does not seem to apply to the larger collection, but I am investigating that...

It is all still under construction to some extent, but I would like you all to know it is there, and would appreciate any input you have.

Much of the site is designed and under the control of NYPL's web design folk, and the scanning was handled in our digital lab. Map division staff selected the maps and cataloged them, and composed descriptive text. Over the next few months we will continue to polish this thing, but I want you all to know it is there and use it at will.

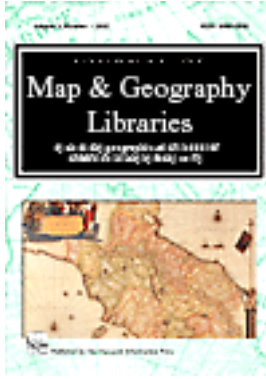

NEMO Member Heading for Sabbatical

Paige Andrew, NEMO member, is headed "out" for sabbatical from July 1-Dec. 31, 2004. Paige will be researching and compiling citations for a cartobibliography of 19th century maps of Pennsylvania at institutions such as the Geography and Map Division of the Library of Congress, the Pennsylvania State Archives, and the State Library of Pennsylvania, as well as his home institution of the Pennsylvania State University. Trips to Washington, D.C., Harrisburg, and possibly Philadelphia and the Free Library there are in the offing. Paige hopes to create a searchable online database open to all users of Pennsylvania historical maps, likely linked from the Penn State University Libraries' website, but might also publish his findings in a hardcopy atlas form. Although he will be away from his office and normal map cataloging and other duties, he will be checking email regularly so please feel free to stay in touch, ask cataloging questions, or just ask "how's it going?" during this six-month period.

NEMO Members Run Map Cataloging Workshops

Members **Paige Andrew** and **David J. Bertuca** each gave full-day workshops on map cataloging. David made his presentation on October 14, 2003 to the Northern New York Library Network (North Country 3R's Council). Attendees came from Northern New York State, Vermont, and Maine. Paige's workshop was at Rutgers on Oct 27, 2003 and was also well attended.

David has been invited to make another presentation in September to the New England Technical Services Librarians at the New England Library Association conference in September 2004 in Manchester, NH.

North East Map Organization Annual Business Meeting, June 13, 2003

The NEMO annual business meeting, held at the Science Center at Simmons College, Boston, MA, was called to order by Captain David Bertuca at 9:00 a.m. on June 13, 2003. Minutes of the 2002 annual meeting have been published in the *NEMO Newsletter*.

Heather Hoffman, Treasurer, reported the balance as of May 31, 2003 was \$1128.97, with a number of checks for membership, map sales and meeting registrations not included in this total.

David Bertuca reported that sales of Ground Zero maps recouped costs and resulted in a small profit. Although the paperwork involved created some problems, the information about NEMO included in the mailings to purchasers raises the organization's profile. We might wish to consider publishing and selling another map in the future.

The Newsletter web version gets a lot of hits. NEMO may wish to pay an annual fee to register a separate domain providing that a unique, descriptive name and a reliable registry can be identified.

Haworth is publishing a new journal on map librarianship to be edited by Paige Andrew and Mary Laarsgard. They are looking for articles. In addition, they have asked to purchase the NEMO mailing list for a one-time mailing. The consensus was that for a nominal fee we would be willing to print a set of labels and send out material provided to us by the publisher.

To date, there have been about 45 NEMO membership renewals. In light of concerns about membership levels, all attendees were encouraged to try to bring one additional person to next year's meeting. Other methods to increase membership that were suggested include: offering a new member discount, creating a brochure about NEMO to be distributed with membership applications at other professional meetings, and increasing our ties with other professional groups. Paige Gibbs will assist with membership brochure. David Bertuca will compile a list of potential organizations. The organizations identified so far include Boston Library Consortium, ACRL-New England, New England Research Libraries, state and New England GIS groups, and Government Documents Librarians of New England.

There was extensive discussion of the relationship between membership and meetings and exploration of options for both meeting locations and meeting times. Attendance might be increased by holding a meeting jointly or sequentially with another larger organization, such as ACRL-NE. This would require flexibility in the scheduling of our meeting time, but might allow us to consider offering training to a wider group via workshops or presentations and would provide other venues for distributing organization information.

For meetings not coordinated with other groups, there was consensus that finding a "home base", probably in the Boston area, would be desirable to reduce the logistics of meeting planning. Meeting locales could rotate, returning to the home base on a two or three year cycle. Meetings can be held in other parts of the Northeast that offer inexpensive meeting and residence options (such as college facilities) and interesting sites for related field trips. Rhode Island is the tentative choice for next year's meeting. Worcester, MA is another future locale. A group consisting of Patrick McGlamery, Jim Walsh, Lisa

Brainard, Paige Gibbs, and several others have volunteered to meet and plan the Rhode Island meeting. Additional assistance is welcome.

David Bertuca asked for members to contribute articles for the newsletter, including summaries of this year's talks, and information for the NEMO web site (information about members' web sites would be especially welcome).

After a discussion of the duties of Captain NEMO and Captain-Elect (AKA First Mate), Joanne Perry agreed to be nominated as Captain-Elect. The incumbent Treasurer and Secretary agreed to continue in their offices. All were elected. David Bertuca retired as Captain, with the thanks of the group, and Patrick McGlamery assumed the role of Captain.

Harvard Map Cataloging Project

Dear Colleagues -

After several years of discussing the possibilities, we are pleased to announce that the Harvard Map Collection has begun to catalog its antiquarian map collection. This weekend (April 2-3) we will be remodeling the interior of the Map Collection to create a more efficient processing area so that we can have more room to review and catalog the maps. We will, of course, concentrate our cataloging efforts initially on the Boston and New England regions. Our plans are to quickly move into the America's, North America, and colonial America collections as well. Initial sampling for some of these maps reveals that we will be able to take advantage of the excellent cataloging already completed at the Library of Congress and other research library institutions.

As with any such project, it is inevitable that duplicates will be identified. We are also finding many duplicates between our atlas collection and those of the flat map collection. Since so many of the atlases are difficult to use and our patrons always want the area usually found in the "gutter" it had been decided that these maps would be far more valuable to our users if they were flat. Since we have no intention of selling the atlases, thereby

The Map and Geography Round Table (MAGERT) of the American Library Association is planning an online serial publication.

The new serial was authorized in January, and we plan to begin publication this summer. Tentatively called "Cartographic Contributions," it will focus on map librarianship, GIS, history of cartography, maps on the Internet, cartobibliography, and other subjects relating to maps. It is intended to be international and interdisciplinary in scope.

It will be an irregular "open access" publication. There will be no charge to authors, and articles will be available without subscription to anyone on the Internet. Contributions will be peer-reviewed. Articles that take advantage of such capabilities of the Internet as color images and hyperlinks are particularly encouraged.

Because we are still establishing our policies and recruiting our board of editors, the web page describing the new publication is not yet being made public. Anyone interested in publishing an article in the new journal or serving on the editorial board should contact me directly.

Calling For Papers**

Journal of Maps: a new multi-disciplinary, international journal Website: <http://www.journalofmaps.com> Launch: 4th May 2004 Mike J Smith, Editor-in-Chief

We are pleased to announce a "call for papers" for the newly created Journal of Maps (JoM). The establishment of JoM has come out of the realization that academic map publication is in gradual decline. JoM will provide a channel for researchers to publish map based material not normally accepted by traditional journals that can then be referred to and viewed by others. JoM has been established as a UK charity, aiming to publish original, bespoke, maps from any discipline. The editorial panel has been specifically put together to provide a broad range of knowledge, expertise and experience. As a journal, we suspect that initial emphasis will be upon traditional geo-subjects, however other subject areas will be strongly encouraged to submit original work.

JoM is an entirely electronic, online journal. All published material will be given away freely and therefore JoM has opted to follow a reverse publishing model. The author will pay a nominal fee to cover the review and distribution process. The journal's website (<http://www.journalofmaps.com>) will provide a fully searchable front-end to JoM's published materials. We

accept that not everyone will want to view maps electronically and therefore all materials will be of press publishable quality.

In order to use the online facilities of JoM, a user needs to register. Basic registration allows access to published materials; personal details need to be provided in order to submit a map for publication. The principal author will need to supply a press-quality map and a short article ready for review. The article should describe the data presented in the map and any pertinent techniques used during the collection/mapping process. We will not accept long articles incorporating data analysis and interpretation, as these would be better published in traditional subject-based journals. The principal author should also supply the details of two people who may act as external referees; these persons should not have recently published with the author(s) or work at the same institution. When submitted, an article will be reviewed by two members of the editorial panel, in addition to the two external referees.

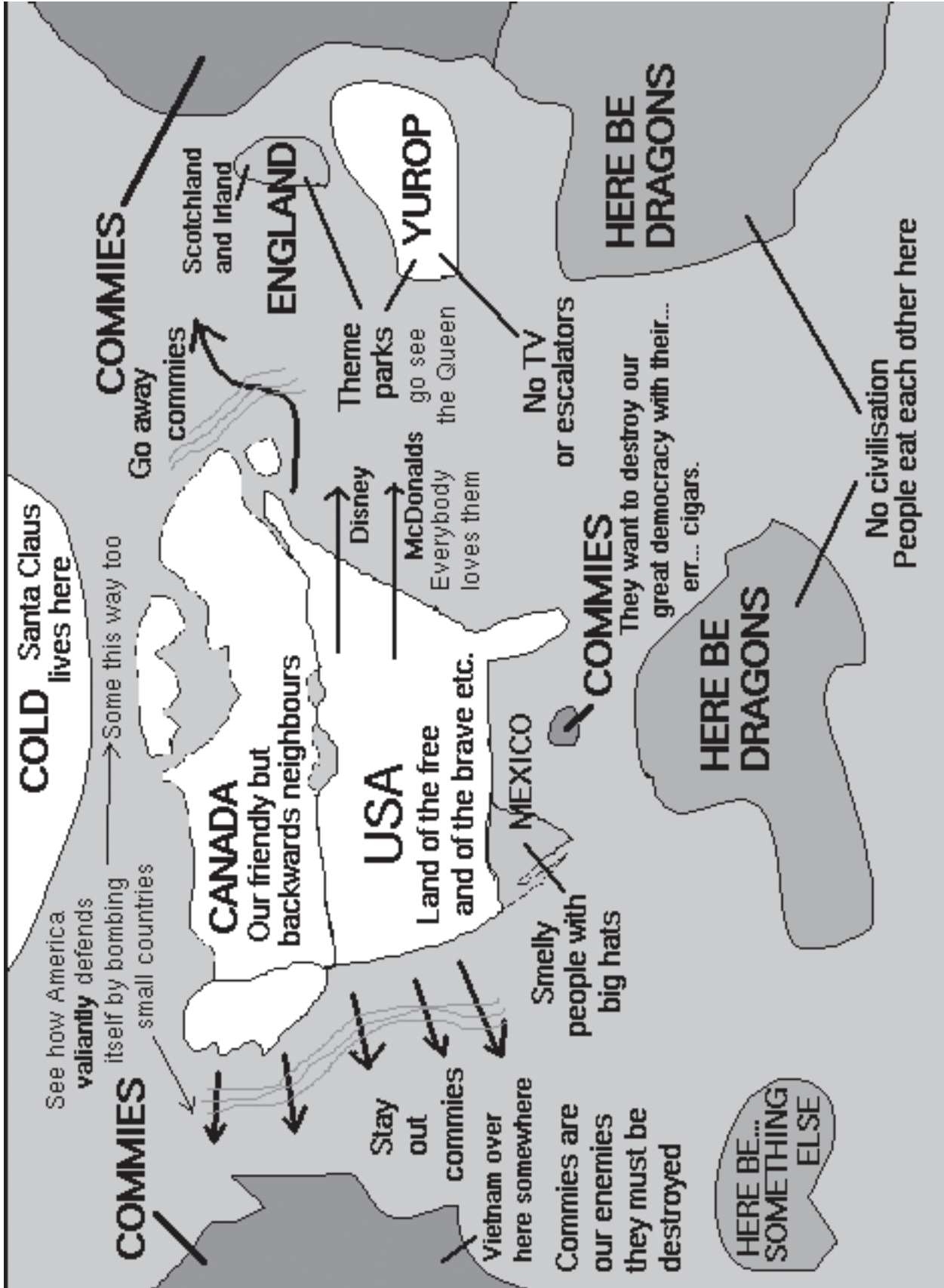
(launched Jan. 2004) “The website has two separate sections [contribution and subscription] and you are welcome to join one or both of them.”
