**KAISER RECOMMENDS DARLING SUPPORT DIEHL APPOINTMENT**

Dunkirk Park Commissioner Says Buffalo Man is Faithful to Duties.

Denying allegations George Diehl of the Allegany State Park commission is often unavailable for meetings, Fred G. Kaiser, Dunkirk member of the commission, Saturday told Assemblyman Carl E. Darling that Diehl was one of the most faithful attendants at all meetings of the commission despite his part time residence in New York city.

"Diehl is one of the best informed men on that commission," Kaiser said. "He knows what is going on in the parks and I'm sure he has been at Allegany Park as often as most of the members of the commission."

Action to bar reappointment of Diehl to the park commission originated among a group of Erie county men who at the time believed they had the backing of Assemblyman Darling and Senator Leigh G. Kirkland of Fredonia in the move. Darling said today they gave a false impression. "I am still investigating the matter and am not yet ready to recommend action either way."

The reappointment of Diehl or appointment of another man to the commission will be made by Governor Lehman but must be approved by the senate. Recommendations of legislators from the area served by the park will bear considerable weight in the final decision.

**SAFE DRIVER REBATE ON INSURANCE POLICIES IS HELD UP ANOTHER MONTH**

Downstate Agents Raise Objections to Premium Losses.

Insurance policies under which safe drivers would be granted a premium rebate for completing a year without an accident claim, will be withheld from New York state drivers and car owners at least another month, according to a communication received here today.

The "safe driver" plan, scheduled to go into effect Feb. 1, was held up after down-state insurance agents objected strenuously to premium losses, part of which they, along with other agents, must bear under the plan.

W. W. Heppell, Dunkirk insurance broker, today expressed hope the plan would receive approval of the state superintendent of insurance to permit its going into operation the first of March. The plan had already been approved by the state insurance board.

**DUNKIRK LAD MISSING FROM HOME TWO WEEKS**

**WINDSTORM CUTS OFF POWER IN JAMESTOWN**

Jamestown, Jan. 31.—Power interruptions, believed to have been caused by a heavy windstorm Sunday, left an estimated 700 homes and other places without electricity for over an hour here late Sunday evening.

Primary wires hurled to the ground by the force of the wind were re-erected within an hour, but an "open" which cut off three circuits in the same vicinity was still being sought by municipal power employees early today.
