Monday, June 8
The N. Y. State Employment Service office issued its first call of the season for persons to pick strawberries.

The Flying Dutchmen of Hose Company No. 1 won first prize in a parade at Salamanca Sunday.

The Fred Koch brewery donated \$200 to the fund being raised to send the Hose 1 and 4 drum corps to the World's Fair. Officials said half of the \$5,000 goal has been raised to date.

Tuesday, June 9
There were 1,046 eligible for unemployment insurance Friday, June 5, four more than on the previous Friday, the state employment service office reported.

The temperature climbed to 85 degrees to tie the record for June 9 set in 1959.

Officials reported city water pumpage during May totaled 135,142,000 gallons, 3,000,000 gallons more than in the corresponding month a year ago.

The Public Service commission announced it will hold a public hearing at the city hall July 7 on a petition of the Pennsylvania Railroad company to discontinue less carload freight service at its Dunkirk station.
