**ALIEN REGISTRATIONS REACH 275 IN DUNKIRK**  
Alien registrations in Dunkirk undoubtedly will approach the 400 mark, William Wheelock, in charge of registration, predicted today.

With registration time less than half gone, the Dunkirk post office already has 275 non-citizens signed up and there has been no great decline in the rapidly with which new registrations are coming in.

First estimates were that there were about 200 aliens in Dunkirk but this has been revised upward until it now is believed nearly 400 will be signed by the time the registration period expires Dec. 27.

## CATTLE STEALING HARD CRIME TO COPE WITH IN COUNTY, SHERIFF SAYS

Mayville, Oct. 14.—Reports of cattle stealing, the modern motorized version of the cattle rustling days of the old west, are being received week in and week out by the county sheriff's office, here, which finds it a difficult crime to cope with.

The stealing generally consists of backing a truck up to a pasture fence in a sparsely populated area on a little travelled road and herding a few cows or young stock into the conveyance. The truck is hurried to a market and generally the theft is not discovered until several hours after it takes place.

Chicken stealing is accomplished on a large scale in the same manner, the sheriff's office says. Three men charged with stealing calves several months ago received sentences when they pleaded guilty to petit larceny, the sheriff's office stated.

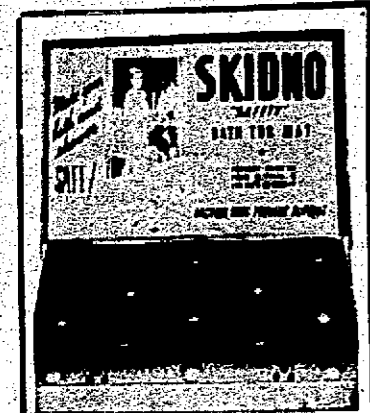
