The following ordinance will be presented for approval at the regular meeting of the Supervisors of White Township, Indiana County, Pennsylvania to be held on Wednesday, August 14, 1974, at 8:00 o'clock P.M. (E.D.S.T.) at their office at 950 Indian Springs Road, Indiana, Pennsylvania:
AN ORDINANCE OF WHITE TOWNSHIP, INDIANA COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, PROHIBITING WEEDS AND SIMILAR VEGETATION TO GROW OR BE PERMITTED IN RESIDENTIAL AREAS AND PROVIDING FOR THE REMOVAL THEREOF AND PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.
Be it enacted and ordained by the Township of White of Indiana County, Pennsylvania, and it is hereby enacted and ordained as follows:
SECTION 1: It shall be unlawful for any person owning or having an interest in any real estate situated in a residential area of the Township to permit weeds and similar vegetation not edible or planted for some useful or ornamental purpose to grow or remain on the premises owned by him in the said Township and all such vegetation is hereby declared to be a nuisance and detrimental to the health, safety and comfort of the inhabitants of the Township.
SECTION 2: All weeds or other vegetation permitted to grow or remain contrary to the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance shall be cut and removed under the direction of the Township Supervisors and the costs thereof together with the penalties provided by law shall be collected by lien or by an action in assumpsit or any other such manner as shall be provided by law.
SECTION 3: Any person or firm violating Section 1 and 2 of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each offense. It is hereby declared that each refusal and neglect to comply with the terms of Section 1 and 2 of this Ordinance shall be considered a separate violation thereof and notice to the offenders by the Township Authority shall not be necessary in order to constitute an offense. In default of the payment of the fine imposed, the offenders shall be committed to jail for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days.
SECTION 4: If any sentence, clause, section or part of this Ordinance is for any reason found to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, such unconstitutionality, illegality or invalidity shall not affect or impair any of the remaining provisions, sentences, clauses, sections or parts of this ordinance.
SECTION 5: This Ordinance shall become effective five (5) days after its adoption.

Income Settlements Up In 1974

WASHINGTON (AP) — Spurred by declining spending power of workers, labor unions have negotiated contracts during the second quarter of 1974 that provide for pay hikes averaging 9.2 per cent, according to the Labor Department.
By comparison, wage settlements rose an average of 6.2 per cent in the first quarter, the final three-month period before wage controls expired April 30.
Government figures show the real spendable earnings of the average factory worker — take-home pay adjusted for inflation and taxes — dropped nearly 5 per cent compared with the past year.
The 9.2 per cent wage gain reported Thursday by the Labor Department was the highest quarterly figure since the final quarter of 1971, when first-year settlements averaged 10.5 per cent.
The Nixon administration, concerned that explosive wage settlements will only lead to further price increases, has urged restraint by both industry and labor.
