While working in the boat yard this spring, I had the opportunity to observe and interact with RCR's yard team of Bruce Lort, John Hall and Jim Jaremka. They enjoy their work and are eager to please. A few weeks ago, mooring specialist Bob Reese broke his foot just as moorings were supposed to start going in. No problem for the RCR team. It was reported that Bob was perched at the window of his home above Water Street giving mooring placement directions over a handheld radio. I believe that, for a Club as small as ours, we are very lucky to have the support of RCR Yachts.

With one year under their belt, the food and beverage service provided by the Le Metro staff has really developed into a quality operation. Clare, Shelby, Sara, Hillary, Brandy, Colin, the kitchen staff and busers are all dedicated to provide the best service possible. Behind the scenes, Maura Crawford, Vince McConeghy and Allen Lawson work closely with VC House Mike Banks on everything from entertainment to improving the kitchen equipment and functionality. Like RCR, Le Metro is able to run the YYC operation because they have other businesses that provide revenue and allow them to leverage vendors, staff and inventory.

I don't need to tell anyone how much we all count on our office manager, Josie Fittante. She is the glue that holds YYC together. She works tirelessly on behalf of the Club and always has the best interest of the members in mind. In the years I have worked closely with Josie, I have relied on her experience and judgment. Josie regularly saves the Club money by closely monitoring expenses and seeking out the best possible pricing. She is a valuable resource to YYC and a very dear person.

Your comments in the member survey were very supportive of the people and departments I've discussed, but we know there is always room for improvement. You can help by directing your comments directly to the officer or director in charge of the specific area instead of the staff. We can all help make our Club run more efficiently by scheduling yard work early and making dinner reservations whenever possible.

YYC Member Survey

As mentioned in the previous Ripples, the response to the survey was very good and most felt the Club does a pretty good job. I'd like to review one aspect of the survey results in this issue of Ripples – Restaurant & Bar.

There has always been a debate over whether YYC should just be place to get a "Hamburg or hotdog" or offer quality entrees for those who enjoy a nice dinner – so we asked the question. Overall, 60% listed entrees as their 1st priority in dining preference, and 37% listed pub menu as 1st priority. Interestingly, the majority of both regular and social members listed entrees as 1st priority: 52% and 69% respectively. Whether you are interested in a hamburger or steak, a good restaurant operation is important to our membership. With respect to the quality of restaurant and bar, hours of operation, and pricing, this is the way member respondents felt:

Restaurant Service: 59% felt service is good to excellent; 39% felt service is okay or needs improvement.

Bar Service: 68% felt service is good to excellent; 25% felt bar service is okay or needs improvement.

Hours of operation: 53% felt hours of operation were about right; 36% felt hours could be expanded.

Food Prices: 63% felt prices were fair; 33% felt we need to lower our pricing.

Bar Prices: 73% felt prices were fair; 19% felt they are high.

While a majority of the people responding felt this aspect of our Club is going pretty well, anywhere from 20% to 40% depending on the topic felt we are average or need to improve. As a private club, we cannot afford to be "average"; we need to provide exceptional value for all our members.

The House Committee along with our concessionaire Le Metro is focused on reviewing your written suggestions – of which there are many – and doing everything they can to provide a restaurant/bar operation that ALL our members and guests rave about.

With respect to social events, the majority – 89% enjoy all the parties and by and large think they are well organized. When you compare Regular members compared to Social members, most Regular members prefer the traditional "Yacht Club" events like the Commodore's Ball, Tea Dance etc...; and most social members list as their first priority the holiday parties like Mother's Day, Wassail etc.... While this breakdown might be expected, it provides valuable information to the House/ Entertainment committee about the preferences of our membership in planning and promoting future events.

Next month we will take a look at the results for YYC boating related activities.

Erie Barge Canal Tolls Eliminated

Dear Boating Enthusiasts:

I am pleased to announce that tolls for recreational boating on the New York State Canal System for the 2006 navigational season have been eliminated!

Recently, Governor Pataki proposed and the Canal Corporation approved the elimination of tolls for 2006 as part of a pilot program to improve boater access and expand tourism on the State's canals. Therefore, boaters do not need to purchase a pass this season to travel along New York's historic waterway.

This initiative is a part of our efforts to help New Yorkers and tourists throughout the nation rediscover the Canal System and revitalize communities along the Canal Corridor. I expect more exciting announcements like this in the near future.

I hope you will tell all of your friends and family members to come out and experience this unique, and now TOLL FREE, statewide resource: New York State's canals.

St. Croix International Regatta

I ended up running the foredeck for them with a 2,400 sq. ft. asymmetrical



spinnaker. Managed to avoid shrimping with the A-sail, but we screwed the pooch in the regatta.

After ramming into the transom of a smaller boat on the starting line the second day of racing, the owner decided to bag racing on the third day. The St. Croix YC Commodore asked me to race on his trimaran *PIGLET*, and I was joined by an ex-Redwing 30 owner from Rochester, Jim Nealon. We had a great couple of races, but got squeaked out by a much larger trimaran.

While at the regatta, I ran into Jose' from San Juan whom I had met the previous year. Jose' has a C&C 37, and after he discovered that his boat was made in our "backyard" we struck up an immediate friendship.

Short version: Jose' asked if I was free after the regatta, and I accepted his invitation to sail his C&C over to Tortola. The voyage over was in 25-35 K winds, tight reaching into 8-10 foot seas, and I was really glad I was on a well built C&C.

I enlightened Jose' that he was from PR, to which he corrected me saying that he knew everyone in Tortola. YYC 75th Anniversary May 1931: YYC Is Formally Incorporated

According to a fragment of an early attempt to chronicle YYC's history, the Youngstown Yacht Club was formally established at a meeting on May 7, 1931. A detailed and lengthy "Constitution" was adopted, officers were elected, and a decision was made to incorporate the organization.

The historian (unknown?), whose handwritten document for the year 1931 is included in the historical YYC papers now preserved, begins his narrative of 1931 events with a paean to the Club's magnificent location:

"The Lower Niagara River has long been noted for its scenic beauty. From Lewiston, NY to Lake Ontario it is essentially at lake level and its uniformly deep water free from rocks & shoals make it ideal for pleasure boating. Near the moth of the river at Youngstown N.Y. there is ample space & shelter for mooring even the largest yachts. Old prints of the middle 1800s show a forest of masts of schooners So it is little wonder that for many years yachtsmen had looked at that spot as an ideal location for a yacht club."

By May, approximately fifty members had signed up. The following officers and trustees were elected at the May 7 meeting:

Jasper M. Rowland, Commodore Augustus G. Porter IV, Vice Commodore John A. Williamson, Rear Commodore William P. Murphy, Secretary: Richard Cary, Treasurer Trustees: Charles W. Guernsey F. W. Scott, Henry P. Lammerts Arthur E. Murphy Harry LaRose. The Trustees were empowered to negotiate a lease

with the village of Youngstown for the "Haskell property on the river bank." A building already on the property would be remodeled for the Clubhouse, and a "concrete pier & slip" was also conveniently in place there.

Enthusiastic racers from the beginning, the officers immediately began planning for the new Club's first regatta, to be held on July 4, 1931.

A typed document dated May 9, 1931, provides the business affiliations of the original officers and trustees. It is evident that Youngstown Yacht Club members were prominent in the development of the electric power and chemical industries of the Niagara region. The Porter family owned most of the land in Niagara Falls that

became sites of the electric power industry as well as the scenic state reservation. Jasper Rowland and Charles Guernsey were with Hooker Electrochemical Co., John Williamson with Carborundum Co., and F. W. Scott with Niagara Falls Power Co. Cary and Murphy had business addresses at the Gluck Building, possibly affiliated with Porter. LaRose owned a lumber company. A little research using the Niagara Falls City Directories of the period, available in the local history collection of the Niagara Falls Public Library, could discover the business connections of other charter members of the Club.

Next month this column will provide details of the original Club Constitution and Bylaws. Judy Volpe

Second YYC Snowbird Reunion

Twenty six current and former members and friends of the Youngstown Yacht Club dined at Cabbage Key on Monday March 20th. The party included the Hofs from St. Petersburg, Woodburns from North Port, the Swains & the Reeses from Punta Gorda, the Kelleys from Bradenton, the Hindes from Bonita Springs, the Bazemores from Dataw Island NC, the Hughes and McGuires as well as the Noonans, Huggins, Ackermans & Kolms from Burnt Store.

The trip to Cabbage Key aboard the *Cambridge Lady* took about 1½ hours as we cruised west from Burnt Store through the Charlotte Harbor Aquatic Preserve to the Inland Waterway and then south to Cabbage Key. Along the way we passed Useppa Island and were entertained with stories about the island's history and its use as a training site for the Bay of Pigs invasion.

The *Cambridge Lady*, a Chesapeake coastal cruiser draws just 4 feet and with her single prop 130 turbine Cummings engine managed a speedy 10 knots.

The Cambridge Lady, Captain Frank and First Mate Sherrie Herbert, spend winters at Burnt Store and summers at Cambridge, Maryland. According to the Herberts it takes about 2 1/2 weeks to make the 1,400 mile trip from Punta Gorda, across Florida on the Okeechobee Waterway to Stuart, and then north to their home base in Cambridge.







The Herberts, he's a former college counselor with 17 years in the merchant marine, she's a former bank officer, retired about 12 years ago and decided to switch from recreation sailing on the Chesapeake to a second career as tour boat operators on the Chesapeake.

Since the season up north is fairly short, they were soon looking for a winter home for their operation and found that Charlotte Harbor offered an ideal location. Built in 1992 in Albany NY, the Cambridge Lady has been doing day trips to Cabbage Key, Boca Grande/ Gasparilla Island, Mattlacha and Useppa Island for 8 years.

Cabbage Key, a small barrier island is privately owned by the Wells family and in addition to the restaurant, rents small cottages to the tourists.

Cabbage Key claims to be the location where Jimmy Buffet penned the lyrics to "Cheeseburger in Paradise;" and if you wish to return to the island, your are encouraged to leave a dollar bill posted on the walls. From the looks of all those dollar bills, everyone wants to return.

After a tasty dinner at Cabbage Key which included an appetizer of fresh (smoked that day) salmon, we departed for Burnt Store. During the trip back, in addition to enjoying the great star display there was some discussion about a 3rd Annual Reunion to be held in March 2007. Tentative plans include either a potluck dinner at the Tiki Hut or a dinner on Sunday night and then cruise to Useppa Island for lunch the following Monday. Capetown South Africa

Sheila Hirsch and Michael Kalm recently returned from Cape Town, South Africa and sent along the snap shots below.

Cape Town has been described as "Mother City of Africa, and the Western Cape, an area which is regarded as one of the most beautiful regions in the world. The City is a rare cultural gem, resulting from the amalgamation of Indonesian, French, Dutch, British and German settlers, the local Bushman and Hottentot tribes, and the Bantu tribes from the north.

"The impressive presence of Table Mountain, flanked by the legendary Devil's Peak and historical Signal Hill, stands proudly above the city. Beautiful white sandy beaches along a peaceful coastline frame the Cape Peninsula, which is famed for its unique floral kingdom, bountiful rivers, vleis and dams and magnificent countryside.
