Principles and Definitions from Plato's *Euthyphro*

Axioms for the Discussion

- <u>A0</u>: Religion and the nature of piety are rational matters (4e)
- <u>A1</u>: The pious is the same in all instances, similarly the impious is the same in all instances (5d)
- <u>A2</u>: Piety and impiety are always the opposes of each other (5d)
- <u>A3</u>: The character of piety will be found in whatever is pious (5d)
- <u>A4</u>: Piety is the paradigm pattern (*paradeigma*) we grasp when we know piety (6e)

Euthyphro's Definitions of Piety (or Holiness)

- <u>*D1*</u>: What Euthyphro is doing right now with his father is pious (5d-e)
- <u>D2</u>: What is pleasing to the gods is pious, what is not is impious (7a)
- $\underline{D3}$: What is pleasing to all the gods is pious, impiety is what they all hate (9e)
- <u>D4</u>: Piety is that part of justice which has to do with the careful attention which ought to be pad to the gods (12e)
- <u>**D5**</u>: Piety is the science of prayer and sacrifice (14b)
- <u>**D5'</u>**: Piety is the science of how to ask from and give to the gods (14d)</u>
- <u>**D5''</u>**: Piety is the art of conducting commerce between gods and men (14e)</u>
